1 The name is devised from one part wings, one part craft beer. Part one: The wings. Knowing that their customer would primarily consist of men, particularly football-watching men, the guys at Wingcraft in **Tanger Outlet The Walk** — brothers Nick and Antonio Ballias — developed a menu of 13 different styles of wings. Naturally, they have traditional, Buffalo blue and hot 'n honey style, but they also have finger-licking, lip-smacking wings such as roasted red pepper sriracha, chipotle BBQ and even Greek style — made with their mom's own homemade tzatziki sauce. Order eight wings for only \$8.99. Ask for extra napkins.

2 Part two: craft beer. Craft beer being all the rage these days, the fabulous Ballias boys jumped right on that bandwagon. They carry 20 craft drafts and approximately 30 bottles. Look for taps with names such as **Oskar Blues**, **Troegs** and **Stone Brewing Co.** They even have a very nice selection of New Jersey brews such as **Tuckahoe**, **Carton**, **River Horse**, **Kane Brewery** and the soon-to-be-carried **Cape May Brewing Co.** Wingcraft often gets preferential treatment to a brewery's rarer stuff because they'll have their tap handle, well, handy. Another cool thing? They cook with these beers! You'll see menu items such as their short ribs braised in **Left Hand Milk Stout**, their pulled pork cooked in **Original Sin Hard Cider** and even the glaze for their salmon is made with **Allagash White**.

3 A bar cannot live on beer alone. The bar at Wingcraft, which is surrounded by walls of radical, mismatched reclaimed wood that the brothers put up as if it were some sort of perplexing lumber puzzle, also has a menu of their own signature cocktails. When there, be sure to try either the **Bloody Maria** (\$9), which is a spicy Mexican spin on the Bloody Mary made with **Avion** silver tequila, a hot, homemade Bloody Mary mix and served with a pickle; the **Berry Lemonade** (\$9) with muddled blueberries and lemons, **Three Olives** vodka, lemonade and soda served in a pint; or the **BLT** (\$8) where the "B" stands for **Bulleit** bourbon, the "L" for lemonade and the "T" for tonic.

4 Two happy hours are twice the fun. Wingcraft recently started two happy hours each day from Monday to Friday. The first is from 3 to 6 p.m. and the latter is 9 to 11 p.m. During these times, you can get a nice array of appetizers such as sliders, flatbread, Buffalo bites or white truffle mac 'n' cheese for only \$5. There's also a rotating tap special for five bucks and the Tuckahoe beer-of-the-week is just \$4. Nice deals when you consider beers usually runs \$7 to \$8. To sweeten the pot even further, the guys are looking into having live acoustical music during happy hours in the offseason.

5 Get ready for football Sundays. Each Sunday during football season, head to Wingcraft to watch the game on their two brand new 70-inch flat-screen TVs. Stick around all day from 1 to 10 p.m. and take advantage of their many happy hour deals that are extended for the duration of the games. And if the Eagles are playing, they'll offer a deal on a Philly beer such as **Yards** and another special on beer or liquor from the competing team's town or state. For instance, if Philly is playing a California team, they may discount **Lagunitas** beer. Or if they're playing Dallas, they may reduce the cost of a **Tito's** vodka cocktail. And regardless of whether you go for football on Sundays or any other day of the week, Wingcraft offers free parking validation for up to three hours at the nearby Applebee's.

Experience a Stockton tradition at the Pitney Pub

Now that September is in full swing, you can be certain of a few things — the stores will become flooded with Halloween merchandise, the Eagles will begin another unsuccessful season of pro football and the Pitney Pub in Galloway will become flooded with Stockton students all looking for the perfect place to unwind for the night.

What to expect:

The Pitney Pub has been a Galloway watering hole for decades. Sure, it's had its fair share of name changes and redesigns over the years, but one thing that's remained constant is the inviting atmosphere, where one might be just as likely to run into a family of four having dinner as you would a rowdy group of college kids slamming down shots. Renovations a few

years back have given the pub a more sleek, clean look that at times can seem a bit in contrast to its "bar-in-the-middle-of-the-woods" roots, but that hasn't eliminated its charm one bit. Think of it as your scruffy uncle wearing a nice suit.

Food and drink:

One of the great things about visiting a bar near a college is the inevitable list of cheap food and drink specials that are not likely to be found elsewhere. Thursday nights at Pitney Pub feature \$1 tacos with \$3 Coronas and Dos Equis. "Wild Wednesdays" offer \$3 drafts and \$4 house shots.

One twist you likely won't see coming is that the menu here dips far deeper into the culinary world than your average tavern would ever dare. Items such as the New Zealand rack of lamb (\$28) and wild mushroom risotto (\$7) deliver on taste and creativity and challenge the notion "pub grub."

Live music:

Fridays at Pitney Pub feature an ever-changing lineup of live bands playing everything from modern rock to classics, while on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays the top local DJs take over the reins.

Coming up:

Each week this fall Pitney Pub will be having "Pong Tuesdays" — a lively beer pong tourney featuring prizes, specials and two live DJs.

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Spotlight: Cornmeal

More than 100 years ago, deep in the heart of the Appalachian mountains, it was customary for musicians to sprinkle cornmeal across the dance floor before every performance. It was believed that this would ensure a plethora of crops at harvest time. Modern science may have disproven this practice, but one thing's certain: The sounds of bluegrass have taken root in the public's consciousness, and Chicago's Cornmeal is helping to spread this sound across the country like grains of corn across a newly plowed field.

"The 'jam band' sound has always had so much in common with bluegrass," says bassist Chris Gangi, who plays the string bass, a classic instrument associated closely with many early American musical genres.

Fusing modern styles with classic Americana creates an entirely different sound, however. As Gangi says, "Some people actually call us 'jam grass.'"

Much like a classic bluegrass or jazz act, Cornmeal structures their songs around an improvisational, solo-centric format. With sets that last upwards of two or three hours, there's a lot of breathing room at every show.

"Everybody gets their turn," says Gangi, adding that there is a certain degree of improv incorporated into each show they play.

Though the genre has never seized control of the Billboard charts, bluegrass has been having an underground resurgence lately. Though it still carries a stigma in some quarters — such as being "hillbilly music," according to Gangi — it has a pure and honest approach that is quickly spreading and influencing other styles.

Some may initially have misconceptions, but Cornmeal finds that most audiences are eventually won over. Even the most skeptical listeners can't resist it for too long.

"We wanted to make this music more accessible to the masses," Gangi says. "I can't tell you how many times I've heard, 'I never liked this stuff! I liked Slayer before I heard you guys!'"

For lyrical inspiration, Cornmeal looks at the world outside their window, often while going sixty miles an hour.

"The road is really prevalent," Gangi says. Tales of traveling, heartbreak, loss and love are all recounted, as Gangi says, "through the lens of the tour bus."

Things didn't start out that way,

though, as Gangi remembers a time when the band was just starting out, performing weekly at a small Chicago pub.

"Being able to watch this grow into a national touring act has been an accomplishment in and of itself," Gangi says. Though they can't attribute their success to sprinkling cornmeal across the stage, he does admit that, "Back in the day, there used to be cornbread a'flying during our shows!"

Cornmeal will perform 7 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 20, at Camp Jam in the Pines, the twice-yearly festival held at the Buena Vista campground. They'll be joined by Sakima, Moot

Davis and Skyla Burrell, as well as several other artists throughout the course of the festival's three-day run.

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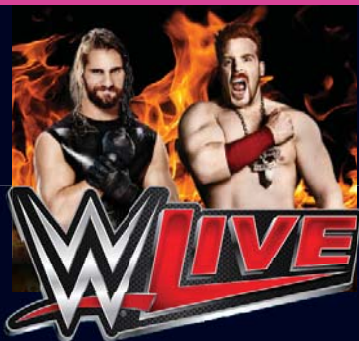

Once again traveling in the area has reaped dividends in finding new places to enjoy good food and good beer.

Having passed the Country Club Tavern on Route 9 in Cape May Court House several times while in that area, and telling myself that I need to stop there, a friend finally invited me to meet him, and I was quite impressed with what I experienced. The building is a combination packaged goods store, restaurant and bar.

I sat at their bar without much hope of finding a libation to my liking, but when I walked to survey the taps, I was pleasantly surprised to see the likes of Great Lakes, Victory, Harpoon, Dogfish Head and more.

My evening was quite enjoyable, and I found myself there again several days later.

I also returned to speak to manager Doug Greenburg, who told me that they began to bring the craft beers online in



June and were doing very well with them.

Our excellent server at the establishment informed us that they prepare their cuisine fresh, and I was very pleased with the quality of the food offerings. The packaged goods store is not to be ignored, either, with a wonderful collection of craft beers to carry home with you after your meal.

Proceeding a bit farther south on the Parkway — just across the bridge in Cape May — you will find the unobtrusive restaurant Lucky Bones.

You can tell that this is a popular place with the locals that are always there and there was also a waiting line on a Monday night after Labor Day.

Luckily two spots at the bar freed up and my friend and I grabbed them quickly. I looked at the beer list and was once again

impressed by the offerings. They poured several Dogfish Heads, Troegs, Firestone, Hoegaarden, Cape May, Victory and then some.

I thought, here is another amazing find right in our area. The food was also worth the trip with something for everyone including salads, sandwiches, entrees, seafood, brick-oven pizza, desserts ... and all served fresh and quickly. Our bartender was very attentive and kept our glasses filled.

A return trip is in my future.

Recently we attended Brews By The Bay, a beer fest sponsored by the New Jersey and Delaware Craft Brewers Guilds at the Cape May-Lewes Ferry. Jersey beers on the Jersey side; Delaware beers on their side.

The ferry took you back and forth to both or you could arrive on just one side.

It was a great idea, and each of the fests was a success, but the Delaware River and Bay Authority proved itself ill prepared for the thirsty throngs that populated the ferry. Several hundred craft beer lovers were confronted with one bartender and the option of only one craft beer that quickly sold out. This was a missed opportunity to bring in some much-needed cash to the authority. Maybe they will do better next year ...
